Principal's Message:

To think, as we begin the month of April, we will only be at school for one day before we begin the Easter break. While some equate this day as an opportunity to play practical jokes as an extension of 'April Fools', it may take away from the religious significance. Thursday, April 1 is Holy Thursday, the commemoration of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ, when he established the sacrament of Holy Eucharist prior to his arrest and crucifixion. Some might suggest, outside of the Resurrection, that this is the most important day in our liturgical year.

Fundamental to our faith is the understanding that Jesus Christ died for our sins and was risen from the dead – the Resurrection. The Easter season reminds us of the sacrifices that Jesus made for all humanity. While through the season of Lent students were reminded to fast (fast from those things that separate us from God's love), to give alms (to give generously to others) and to pray (pray always and pray all ways), at Easter we are reminded to rejoice. We need to rejoice in all that God has done for us, and to be grateful for all that we have.

While rejoicing might seem to be difficult as we are now more than a year into the pandemic and dealing with the various ways it has impacted our lives, I do believe our sufferings pale in comparison to what Jesus had to endure. I also know that our current faith theme challenges us to be grateful and to be gracious. A key understanding of being grateful is to acknowledge the presence of God and to give thanks. I can't think of a better time within our liturgical year to do so.

As we get ready for this school year to end, preparations are well under way for next school year. Thanks to all who have already re-registered their children; this greatly assists us when we look at staffing for next year and how we can best serve the needs of students. We are also accepting new registrations and are looking at various ways to advertise all the great things that are happening within our school, one of which was a promotional video created by Erv Fehr. Grade 4 Parents – We need your Help!

As an annual check-up on the education system, the Accountability Pillar provides an opportunity for Alberta Education and school authorities to ensure that we are equipping students for success.

The Accountability Pillar uses a set of 16 indicators. Data on these indicators consists of surveys of students, parents and teachers on various aspects of education quality, student outcomes such as dropout and high school completion rates, and provincial assessments of student learning. This year's survey will also provide an opportunity to reflect on the impact of COVID-19.

From March to the end of April, Alberta Education will be conducting the annual Accountability Pillar Survey. **Beginning March 25**, parents of students in grades 4, 7 and 10 should receive a survey from Alberta Education. We are asking that you take the time to please complete this. Alternatively, if you have not received a survey by April 12, and are wishing to participate, please contact the school.

All surveys are anonymous and ask questions about experiences with your school. In addition to English and French, the parent survey is available in Chinese, Punjabi, Arabic, Blackfoot, Dene, Cree, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog and Urdu.

Your participation in the survey helps provide important information on the quality of education your child is receiving, so we encourage you to return your survey promptly. The survey will close on April 23, 2021.

The best part is that you don't need anything fancy, just your five senses: Touch, Sight, Sound, Taste, and Smell.

Slow down today and notice how your senses can help you to experience joy.

Touch

When we are mindful about the world around us, it may improve our mood and allow us to experience joy.

- Feel the warm sun, or a warm cup of your favorite beverage.
- Soak up the warmth and snuggle with kid, pets, or other loved ones.
- Tickle fight with kids, or try a foot massage
- Create a sensory guessing game:
 Close your eyes and feel roughness or
 smoothness of different objects in the
 house. i.e. sandpaper, feather, ice cube,
 rice. Play a guessing game and try to
 stump one another.

Sight and Sound

Spending time outdoors, looking and listening to everything around us, positively impacts both our physical and mental well-being.

Go outdoors and take notice of:

- what do your eyes see that bring you joy? Perhaps it is children playing or all of the colours found in nature.
- what the weather is like, warm or crisp?
- what is beneath your feet and the sounds you hear with each step you take?
- what your mood is like and what feelings you are experiencing? Make a playlist of your favourite songs to walk with! Does fresh air, music and movement improve your mood and help you experience joy?

Taste and Smell

Taste and smell are vital to our experience. Our body's ability to provide nourishment is related to how we experience these senses. When we slow down and pay attention to what we are eating we can experience the feeling of joy.

- Think of warm cookies fresh out of the oven - imagine the smell and taste.
- Scents can remind us of past joy. The familiar scent of a candle or perfume can bring calm and serenity
- Dip fruit into melted chocolate. Eat slowly and sayour.
- Cook food in a slow cooker and savour the aroma that fills your home.



Alleluia! Jesus is risen! We rejoice that we are now celebrating the Easter season but on our recent journey through Holy Week, we recalled the story of the Passion and remembered the suffering of Christ. We experienced his pain as he was misjudged, persecuted, and ultimately crucified. And yet there was hope through the resurrection.

Jesus lives on in each of us - his goodness, his decency, his empathy, and his mercy are the gifts he has left us with. We are called to build the kingdom of God and one of the ways we do this is by teaching our children to be empathetic like Jesus. He felt the pain of others, he deeply understood their needs and entered into their experiences. Parents teach their children such important moral lessons every day. If you would like to read some ideas about how to cultivate empathy in your children, you might like to check out this article.

Faith & Family

During this pandemic, we are hearing that some students are spending just too much time online. We all need a gentle reminder perhaps to put down our devices and "look up"! That includes the kids and moms and dads too! There's no better time to "look up" than in the springtime! Spend some time outside this spring - enjoy the nature that God created. Parents, what was your favourite thing to do outside when you were your child's age? Spend some time with your child enjoying that activity and creating a beautiful memory together! That memory will last a lot longer than the pleasure gained by any amount of time scrolling through social media.

In the meantime, if you want some great tips to consider as you supervise your child's use of media, you might like to explore the resources at <u>Common Sense Media</u>.



We have discovered, especially this year, how important it is to be gentle with each other. Today, we engage so much in the digital world. Because of this, it is important that we teach children to be just as empathetic with the person they are interacting with online as they are with a friend sitting beside them in their classroom.

In the 2020 edition of The Catholic Perspective, the Institute for Catholic Education highlighted the life of Carlo Acutis. As they shared in this article, there are many young people who give wonderful witness to how to be empathetic in their online interactions, using the power of media for good. They noted, "The Holy Father offers the example of the newly beatified Carlo Acutis as a digital witness for young people. Carlo is being called a #DigitalDisciple and #CyberApostle for the way he witnessed to his devotion to the Eucharist in his online work...He created a website that gathered and shared information about Eucharistic miracles..."

"The Church recognizes the importance of digital culture, especially in the lives of young people." We are grateful that we have the gift of technology and our prayer is that we use it to help to share the Good News. "In our Catholic schools we are teaching our students that we don't equate faith in Jesus with the culture of 'influencers' and 'followers'", but to discover their own life in the context of their community of faith. (Institute for Catholic Education) Let us give thanks that we have good and holy people showing us the way to live good and holy lives - in person and online!











Catholic Education

All students in Alberta learn about digital citizenship but in our Catholic schools, digital citizenship is taught through the Catholic perspective which is always about maintaining and promoting the dignity of the human person. It is so important to teach our children how to be empathetic as they are learning to use digital media. We teach our students how to ensure their digital footprint is one in which they maintain their own dignity as well as the dignity of those with whom they are communicating.

This <u>document</u> created by the Institute for Catholic Education in Ontario is very much in line with what is happening each day in our Alberta Catholic schools too. Perhaps some of the items on this poster might be helpful to you as you work with your child's school to teach digital citizenship at home too.

Pope Francis offers this encouragement to young people: "You can become what God your Creator knows you are, if only you realize that you are called to something greater. Ask the help of the Holy Spirit and confidently aim for the great goal of holiness. In this way,...you will be fully yourself."

Call for Audit Committee Public Members

Qualifications for the public members:

- Independent to the school division; and
- No financial or personal interests with the school division's audit firm, KPMG.

Public members will be compensated for their time on the Audit Committee, as per <u>Board Policy 18</u>, <u>Appendix A: Trustee Compensation, Allowances and Reimbursement Rates</u>.
